And many programs have specific instructions for their essays (if so, follow those instructions <u>exactly</u>). But all writing is a matter of making choices, and each choice has pros and cons. from advisors, other students, the internet, and the program itself ² about what the program is looking for.

The Introduction Paragraph

There are two basic options for writing this paragraph: (1) direct and (2) anecdote (see examples below). Your readers are busy. They have to read dozens of these essays, and you GRQ WWZDQWWRER misdirect them. Instead, keep things short, simple, and to-the-point. So, I almost always recommend option 1. Option 2: Anecdote. (this example is adapted from an essay for a physical therapy [PT] program) ³: KHQ, ILUVW VW Doubth PTGood of Decoration was to assist the lead therapist with basic exercises for trauma victims. My first patient, call her Maria,

Describe key professional experiences, research, clinical experiences, shadowing, publication, teaching, TA-ing, leadership, conference presentations, or volunteering relevant to your field of study/graduate program. Talk about the experiences in more detail than your résumé allows
